Year 6 Curriculum Newsletter: Spring Term 2024





This term will begin by developing knowledge and skills about Ratio and Algebra.

We will then move on to further developing skills in Fractions, Decimals and Percentages followed by a unit on Area, Perimeter and Volume. We will complete the term by exploring Statistics.

Reading, writing and SPAG will continue to be taught daily. Reading lessons will focus on further developing both fluency, to build speed and accuracy, and also skills to support a deeper understanding of the text. In the first half of the term our Power of Reading text will be *The Highwayman* by Alfred Noyes. This will then be followed with *Macbeth* by William Shakespeare in the second part of the term. Children will be writing in a number of genres including character and setting descriptions, narratives, poetry and letters.

Living Things: Classifying big & small — Children will define the term 'organism' and name the seven life processes of all living things. They will also compare the characteristics of the vertebrate and invertebrate groups and describe the characteristics of flowering plants, ferns, mosses and conifers. Furthermore, they will define the term 'micro-organism' and name some examples.

Royalty and Beyond

How did the political turmoil surrounding the reformation of the church and succession to the crown affect people's lives?





This will be our key question for this term to which all our learning will be linked. We will need to apply our prior learning, analyse sources and complete our own research.

The children will begin the term by exploring the big question of 'Are books enriching?' The following units of study will be at the heart of our learning in RE: SOURCES: The Bible, the special book for the Church.

DEATH AND NEW LIFE: Celebrating Jesus' death and resurrection.

Learning in History will explore the Tudors which will include the Tudor monarchs, life in Tudor times and The War of the Roses. Geography will focus on learning about temperate deciduous forests and Biomes.


